Stringing You Along

Threads have been around almost as long as humans. Fur garments, shelters and other useful items were connected to each other by sewing them together. The first threads were made from thin leather strips, animal tendons, sinew, and twine. Ancient tribes used what they could find in their surroundings, often local plants or trees. For instance, the fibers of honeysuckle, reed and cactus could be used to make thread and rope. In Europe, clematis was used to make twine, and hemp was used for fiber, thread rope and paper. In the Americas, yucca was particularly handy as it had a ready-made needle included: the sword-shaped leaf of the yucca ends in a ferocious point, and peeling it away carefully reveals a thread attached to the point, which can be used for sewing. Eventually humans learned how to twist fibers into thread such as silk (China), cotton (Asia) and linen (Egypt).



Berries, plant matter and bugs were used for coloring, giving rise to more decorative uses of thread, especially after cloth became more refined. Manufacturers now employ different methods of dying thread, often using synthetic colors and dyes.

There are three types of thread: from animal (silk, wool), from plants (cotton, linen) and synthetic (rayon, nylon, polyester).

Silk thread was extremely popular and in high demand as it was stronger and more flexible than cotton. It also gave a nicer appearance with many of the fine materials used for dressmaking. Eventually, silk thread became unaffordable, and cotton thread took over in popularity, especially once it went through the process of mercerization, which made it more lustrous, more flexible, and stronger. Wool threads were also used, though this was not as common as cotton. Nowadays, synthetic threads are the most used in industry as they are cheap and easy to make. Embroideries on garments indicated wealth, standing in the community, spiritual beliefs and artistic value.

Thread is made up of a series of plies – or cords – that are twisted together. Plying and twisting makes for a stronger thread. A ply is defined as two or more strands of cotton, linen, wool or silk twisted together, a cord is two or more plies twisted together.

The embroidery project will determine the type of thread being used. It is important to use good quality thread from reputable manufacturers, however it is best to stick with one manufacturer as finishes and dyes might vary. Thread can be one color throughout, variegated (different shades of the same color in one skein) or overdyed (different colors in one skein). Though manufacturers claim the dyes are colorfast, it is best to test before starting an embroidery.

There are two basic styles of thread: stranded and twisted.

Stranded thread or floss has the advantage that the thickness of the thread can be adjusted to the type of project where

it will be used. For instance, for needle painting one might use merely 1 strand, whereas cross stitching for the most part requires 2 strands. Needlepoint often uses all 6 strands to cover the holes of the canvas. To avoid tangles it is advisable to separate the strands and then put them together again in the required thickness. Stranded thread can come in cotton, silk, wool, linen, rayon, metallic thread and a large variety of colors. Floss out of natural fibers is easier to work with than synthetic or metallic ones, as they twist, tangle and snag easier.





Twisted thread comes in several weights and is not divisible, such as Perle cotton (cotonperlé) - 12 being the thinnest, 3 the thickest. Color selections are not as varied as in floss and diminishes the thicker the thread becomes. These twisted threads can be from cotton, wool, silk, linen and synthetic or metallic material.

The most common type of embroidery thread is stranded floss, twisted perle cotton, wool, silk and linen threads. But there are also a variety of specialty threads such as ribbon used as thread, crochet thread, floche (a mercerized, single strand Egyptian cotton used for

whitework and needlepainting) and filoselle (made from leftover waste of reeled silk) as well as matte embroidery cotton (aka coton à broder – not to be confused with cotonperlé), felted wool or yarn, beading thread and metallic thread.

Ribbon thread is used for ribbon embroidery and comes in a variety of colors and widths. It is usually made of silk, though synthetic ribbon is also available, but not as easy to use. It gives the embroidery a more textured appearance and is often used for highlights with cotton or silk thread embroideries.

Filoselle is a vintage stranded silk thread that comes in a variety of colors, in skeins or on bobbins. It is used for delicate embroideries where luster is important.

Wool and yarn threads are often used in wool embroidery, needlepoint, and tapestry work and can often be replaced with acrylic threads. These are 2- or 3-ply twisted threads. Persian yarn is more loosely twisted than others.

Metallic thread uses real metal such as silver, wrapped around a linen or silk thread. Though it adds glitz and glamour to the embroidery, it can tarnish with time and is hard to work with. These threads are often too thick and unwieldy to fit through the material and are couched instead.

The type of thread you use for your embroidery will depend on the base material being used. Oftentimes embroideries use only one type of thread for the entire project, however, a combination of several different threads can make for an exciting and artistic expression of the finished project. Important to know are the advantages and limitations of the threads used. Consider a more robust thread when the item being stitched will be used often, possibly washed and ironed, as opposed to a wall hanging or picture behind glass. Though price may be a concern, quality threads will be less stressful to work with and give a more lustrous appearance.

This year will be different as the retreat will proceed.. The emphasis, as always, is on holding a retreat safely where you have time to have fun and work on your stitching projects along with 29 like-minded stitchers. There will be some changes this year due to the pandemic and rules still in place at the hotel. We will still be practicing safe distance in the common areas as well as masks are to be worn in common areas which include the lobby and on the way to the restaurant and can be taken off when food and drinks arrive to your table. Housekeeping will not clean your room until you vacate the room and towels will be in bags and placed in your room. There will still be a buffet luncheon except this will not be self-served. 


